So here we are again asking you to support us during our Christmas donation drive. Please dig deep and help us continue to help them. We know you would agree that every Dane deserves a Christmas.





## Disaster prep checklist for pets

Lately it seems that all areas of the country are experiencing weather-related events that require evacuation. Keeping these pet-related items on hand, ideally in a waterproof bag or backpack, means you'll have the essentials ready to go if you



- need to evacuate quickly with your pet. Always remember that if staying put is not safe for you, it's not safe for your pet.
- Food and water for at least five days for each pet, along with bowls and can opener if needed
- A pet first-aid kit, medications and medical records stored in a waterproof container or bag

- For cats, a litter box, litter, scooper and garbage bags
- Sturdy leashed, harnesses and carriers to transport pets safely, and blankets or towels if your pet needs extra warmth
- Your pets' collars and up-to-date identification information
- Photos of you with your pets and descriptions of them in case you get separated.
- Information about your pets' feeding schedules, medical conditions and behaviour issues, along with contact information for your veterinarian



## **Bentley**

We unfortunately lost our boy Bentley yesterday afternoon. Bentley was Amy's soul dog and he had quite the journey to, away, and back to us as his forever home. There were so many things about Bentley and his story where the punchline is, "it was meant to be", and we'll forever miss him.

For those that may not remember, Bentley originally came into rescue as a Craigslist dog - he had who knows how many owners as a young pup, and finally someone picked him up off of craigslist to surrender him to GDRI. We remember picking Bentley up from Cindy as she helped with the transport of him, and on our way home to IL from MI with him, we decided to stop off at a you-pick Blueberry farm. Bentley was such a good boy, he loved walking through the farm with us and was the sweetest boy - it was our first experience with how special he truly was. After we fostered Bentley for a while, he was placed with a couple where he stayed for about a year and a half, and then they returned him to rescue as he had a penchant for giving chase to smaller dogs (which were plentiful in the couple's retirement community).

When Bentley came back into rescue, we welcomed him back to our home - even though we had moved in between, Bentley and our boxer (Madison) guickly picked up where they



left off - playing and romping through the yard happy as could be. Shortly after coming back to us, Bentley developed MegaE, and we battled with the treatment and management of MegaE for a few months - but what felt like eternity. We went through all the usual struggles of Mega, but Bentley continued to struggle and despite our persistence, he continued to lose weight. Amy knew that something else was wrong with Bentley and through a myriad of tests and the unwavering support of this group, we finally discovered that he had Atypical Addison's his body didn't produce Cortisol and he was unable to cope with just about any stressor. The treatment was simple enough (low-dose of prednisone), and shortly after going onto the pred., Bentley made a miraculous recovery - he put on the 50/60lbs he had lost battling MegaE. and the MegaE reversed itself and he was back to being able to eat and drink normally. He was our miracle dog, and shortly thereafter we formally adopted Bentley. He continued to be the happiest boy you could imagine - he was our velcro-pup, and when the other dogs were off doing their own thing, Bentley would be there right by our side (pushing his butt towards us for a good rub).

A couple weeks ago we tweaked Bentley's pred. dosing to see if he would tolerate a slightly lower dose as a means of managing Cushing's- the tweaking of this was a bit rough as Bentley began to show some signs of Addison's again, though it was correctable by re-upping his dose of pred. However, he had a restless night Saturday evening, he didn't sleep and wouldn't lay down for very long - a dose of pred. seemed to help him relax for a bit, but he still didn't sleep at all through the night. Yesterday morning we took him to the vet to try to figure out what was wrong with his Addison's - since so many of his symptoms were like when he was going through his addisonian crisis before - we thought for sure that the

MegaE was returning as so many of the symptoms were the same. We would find out after chest X-rays that Bentley's esophagus was fine, but that his heart was dilated - he was in late-stage congestive heart failure, and fluid was already in his lungs. The symptoms of CHF and Addison's are so similar, we had no idea he even had any other issues outside of Addison's which we were managing. We started aggressive treatment to help Bentley from all angles - to help him breathe easier, get his heart pumping a bit more effectively, and to make him a bit more comfortable. He did well on the treatment but suddenly took a turn for the worse, the disease (which we had just learned about hours ago) had progressed too far, and Bentley passed yesterday afternoon.

To say that we are devastated is an understatement - few outside of this group likely understand the impact of losing a Dane like Bentley - he was our friend, our most loyal companion, and the sweetest boy. He came to us, left for a bit, and came back home to us - everything he did it was as if it were meant to be... I don't believe there are many people out there with Amy's persistence to know that Bentley's MegaE had an underlying cause and she stuck it out for him, as his advocate, to get him better again. And throughout all of his challenges, his personality was always there - loving, goofy, and loyal... From him always wanting to sit RIGHT where you were sitting (but hey, sitting on you works too), to his low growls when he was tired as his way of saying, "This is how I tell you I'm tired and would just like a belly rub"... We'll remember so much about him, words simply cannot do it justice.

We miss you Bentley and we always will.




## **Happy Tails**
